How to Share Your Faith Conference

Session 5: Sharing the Gospel on Campus

1. The purpose of this workshop is not to practice evangelism, but actually to do it by going and proclaiming the gospel.
2. Before you and your partner knock on a door or approach a person, decide who will be the primary speaker.
3. The other partner should be praying throughout the conversation and participate when appropriate.
4. Start by stating who you are and why you are there (ex. "I'm John and this is Mark. We're at a Christian training conference this weekend. Right now we're looking for people who would be interested in talking with us about their spiritual beliefs. Do you have some time to talk?"). Be open about what you are doing.
5. When someone invites you in, first get to know one another briefly (name, year, major, etc.).
6. Three suggestions concerning how to get into a spiritual conversation:
 - a. Ask him to share what he believes about God, the Bible, and Jesus.
 - b. Ask him the two EE questions:
 - i. "Have you come to the point in your spiritual life that you know for sure if you were to die tonight you would go to heaven?"
 - ii. "If you were to die tonight, and you appeared before God and He asked you, 'Why should I let you into my heaven?' What would you say?"
 - c. Give him the Ten Commandments Survey.
7. Discuss his answers. Use as many follow up questions as possible. Show him you are interested in what he thinks. Earn the right to speak by listening. Also, asking good questions will get him to think and hopefully see his need for a Savior. It also helps us to know the best way to share with him.
8. Ask if you can show him an illustration that answers these questions.
9. Make sure he understands. Pray with him if God has convicted him and he is ready to respond to the gospel.
10. If he is not ready to believe, ask if he would be interested in talking again. If possible, offer to return and give him a Bible or a booklet to read.
11. Thank him for his time.
12. Stop and pray him.
